Gestalt psychology or gestaltism (/ ɡ ɛ ˈ ʃ ɔː l t ɪ ˈ ɒ ɡ ɪ ˈ ɪ ʃ t ɪ z əm, - ɡ ɛ ˈ ʃ ɔː l t ɪ ˈ ɒ ɡ ɪ ˈ ɪ ʃ t ɪ z əm /; from German: Gestalt [ɡ ɛ ˈ ʃ ɔː l t] "shape, form") is a philosophy of mind of the Berlin School of experimental psychology. Gestalt psychology is an attempt to understand the laws behind the ability to acquire and maintain meaningful perceptions in an apparently chaotic world.
